CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Tony Topp Chairman

On behalf of the directors of the Northern Football League I present the League's Annual Report for 2011.

FOOTBALL:

Many of the comments we received throughout the year had one common theme; the standard of football within the NFL in 2011 was the best that could be remembered for many years. Division 1 was a terrific competition with sides down to eighth and ninth very competitive and capable of defeating a more fancied opponent on their day. Heading into the last round of the season the top five was not set and Montmorency earned a place in the finals at the expense of Northcote Park, courtesy of a Round 18 win.

With the strength of Division 1 increasing there was also a natural flow on into Division 2 and 3. Division 3 continues to provide opportunity for clubs that have not tasted success for many years to not only have the chance to win matches, but to participate in finals and even win a Grand Final which South Morang did this year for the first time in its 56-year existence.

Junior football continued to see growth with the introduction of two new clubs – Bundoora Park Thunderbolts and Laurimar. With the growth of housing in the Northern areas of our region continuing to increase at a great rate of knots, the NFL expects more junior participants from within these new clubs and from those established clubs to the North.

The NFL took over the management of the Youth Girls competition in 2011 from the AFL with eight teams competing on weekly basis at Barling Reserve under the guidance of Carla Muscat. Whilst in its early days, there is no doubt that participating rates in Australian Rules Football by females is on the increase and the NFL will continue to work with local clubs to provide a competition for young girls to play Australian Rules.

Congratulations to all those that competed in finals for season 2011 at all levels and in particular to those teams that were successful in winning that last game of the year in their respective competition.

NETBALL:

What started out four years ago with only eight clubs continues to grow at a rapid pace. In 2011 there were 36 teams taking to the courts

on a Friday night and already the expectation is that over 40 teams will compete in 2012. The NFL is actively looking for more court space on a Friday night to accommodate this growth.

The finals for 2011 were contested at RMIT University Bundoora with in excess of 750 people at the stadium on Grand Final night. Congratulations to all the girls for the manner in which they compete and to those who won their grand finals – well done.

The Board appreciates the additional efforts of Delwyn Berry for her enthusiasm with this competition and the support provided to her by many.

CLUB COMMITTEES / VOLUNTEERS:

There is no doubt volunteering seems a thankless task at times, but it is an important task within our community. All clubs within our league rely on many to administrate, coach, cook, clean, mark fields, manage teams and the list goes on. Please accept the gratitude of the Board for the work you do within your club environment and that of our wider community.

It was with much satisfaction that one of our own, Tom Gard, from the Parkside Football Club was honoured by AFL Victoria as State Volunteer of the Year – deserved recognition for many years of fine work at Parkside.

BARLING RESERVE:

The NFL continues to work with the Darebin Council in regards to the prospects of moving NFL HQ to Barling Reserve. This would involve the administrative offices of the NFL and the training base for the Northern Umpires Association being located on Plenty Road. The first release of plans is expected to be presented to the Board prior to the end of 2011.

As well as providing an administrative base for the NFL, it is expected that the NFL will have full access and management of the adjoining grounds. This will allow the NFL to continue to promote such activities as Youth Girls football and an under 8 round robin competition.

UMPIRES:

The NFL continues to attract the best ratio of umpire numbers throughout metropolitan Melbourne to fulfill the majority of weekend appointments. This is an outstanding effort from our entire umpire group and makes us the envy of other metropolitan competitions. During the off season the NFL CEO will be working hard with the Umpire Director to set up a team that can provide additional support to this growing group to enhance their development ensuring that umpiring standards and retention remain high within the NFL.

To the Northern Umpires Association – thank you for your continued support of the NFL and its member clubs. It is acknowledged that for several seasons the conditions you have had to train and socialise under have not been ideal. With the continued planning of Barling Reserve, it is hoped that a permanent home for the Northern Umpires Association is closer to reality than may have previously been thought.

It would be remiss when speaking about umpires not to mention the great job that our netball umpires also do on Friday nights.

TRIBUNAL/APPEALS BOARD/MEDIATORS/ INVESTIGATORS:

A group of people who the NFL calls upon to assist as required on a weekly basis. I am sure we would rather not call on them and maybe one day we won't, but until then they have a role and it is very much appreciated by the Board.

NFL ADMINISTRATION:

The NFL has four full-time staff and during 2011 there was a changeover of three of those members. This proved a challenge to the Board and placed a large strain on NFL resources. With the appointment of new CEO Jeremy Bourke, Football Operations Manager Ron McKeown, and Media and Communications Officer Samuel Zito during the year, the Board believes it has the right people in the right positions to improve its administrative support to all member clubs moving forward and fulfill the requirements of the NFL Strategic Plan.

There are also a number of part time positions and volunteer positions within the NFL. This group of people works within our office complex, assists with the management of our functions and activities, works with our development teams and provides our local media coverage. All are important in ensuring that the goals of the NFL are met and the Board is most grateful to those people for their efforts.

I take this opportunity to also thank fellow board director Geoff Dempster for stepping into the role of Acting CEO at the start of the season in what was trying times.

SPONSORS AND PARTNERS.

The ability to provide all the resources required is very dependent on the quality of sponsors that can be attracted to the NFL. The NFL sincerely thanks:

I also give thanks my fellow board directors for their faith in me to represent the NFL as the Chairman of the NFL.

THE FUTURE - WHAT DOES IT HOLD?

The wish list looks something like this:

- A new Strategic Plan providing guidance to all Stakeholders on the future direction of the NFL.
- A new home for the NFL HQ and the Northern Umpires Association.
- Continued growth of junior player numbers.
- Greater alignment of Auskick programs and NFL clubs.
- The introduction of new senior teams.
- Continued growth of the netball competition.


- Continued growth of female football within the NFL.

CEO REPORT

What an outstanding season of football we have had in the Northern Football League in 2011. At the top, a competitive balance the envy of other competitions through to an affirmation that a third division is an important cog in the wheel. The juniors continue to grow at an exciting rate as does our netball and female divisions. The NFL is well placed to capitalise on the opportunities that our region and the investment in our sport delivers and our soon to be released strategic plan will provide the blue print of that capitalisation.

The NFL and its member clubs are leaders in many areas. Our record of being the first league to have 100% Quality Club Accreditation and the Vicsport recognition of the Respect and Responsibility program are key examples. Northern Football League clubs are always well represented in key awards including coaching and volunteer recognition, community engagement, education programs and fundraising activities. Case in point was the selection of Tom Gard (Parkside president) as the Victorian Volunteer of the Year by the AFL.

The popularity of the Northern Football League within the four municipalities it covers (Darebin, Banyule, Whittlesea and Nillumbik) is immense. The combined population in 2011 of these municipalities is approximately 500,000 people and conservative estimates place total crowd attendances at NFL matches (senior, junior and finals) for 2011 at around the same number - 500,000. The league has enormous reach within its boundaries however very little is known of the strength and vibrancy of the competition outside these boundaries. Other competitions market themselves extremely well and thus take prominence in the community football environment. Our challenge in coming years is to continue to build the brand in line with our vision and be instantly recognised as one of, if not the leading, community sporting organisation in Victoria.

2011 saw the introduction of two new clubs to the NFL in Bundoora Park and Laurimar. With another club due to enter in 2012 (Kinglake JFC), the northern region is producing new clubs faster than any other region. It was fantastic to see Bundoora Park enjoy premiership success in their first season – a tremendous reward for the effort start-up clubs require. Laurimar's achievements are not to be underestimated either, although notably they were unable to be rewarded with premiership success as they did not compete higher than the under 9 division. The club's rewards are most certainly to come sooner rather than later.

Unavoidable difficulties as a result of mid-season management changes have undoubtedly affected the 2011 bottom line and in that regard the League has suffered a minor and temporary setback. However, the objective of the NFL is always to maintain a negligible additional year-to-year impost on clubs and securing revenues from external sources will be a constant priority. In the second half of the year, additional and revamped sponsorship agreements brought much needed funds into our operations and that is one area targeted for significant improvement in 2012. Simonds Homes, as the NFL's major sponsor, has been an enthusiastic partner of the League and we are hopeful of entering into a new, longer term arrangement shortly. Bank of Cyprus, as the NFL's ball sponsor, has also been an enthusiastic partner and will continue to be so for the next two seasons (and hopefully beyond). Along with a suite of other sponsors including Boag's, Victor Sports, Coca-Cola, Sports In Focus, Sherrin, Red Onion, Deka Trophies, Hot Sublimation and Studio Blinds, the NFL has aligned itself with recognised, industry leading and superior brands.

With regards to the NFL brand, the League has recently trademarked its logo and entered into licensing agreements with both Buffalo Sports and Hot Sublimation for 2012 through to 2014. Quality assurance and service delivery underpin these new agreements and the merchandising revenue will facilitate programs to build equity in our brand. A strong and respected brand ensures the NFL is at the forefront of an umpire, player or sponsors mind when they are choosing to engage in a local football competition. The tangible benefits of brand development are not always seen immediately or directly however its importance in government relations (at all levels), sponsorship and player/umpire procurement and retention cannot be underestimated.

The NFL continues to develop a stronger community focus and in 2011 partnered with a number of charities to raise awareness and funds for their specific causes. The senior finals series focused on the work of the White Ribbon Foundation and their campaign to end violence against women and the junior finals series supported the work of Zaidee's Rainbow Foundation and their campaign to raise awareness towards organ donation. Other initiatives and awareness campaigns included the Round 18 dedication to prostate cancer awareness through Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia, support of disability programs through our partner councils and promotion of road safety campaigns. The majority of our clubs supported charities through fundraising and awareness events, making a significant and valuable contribution to a range of causes. A significant focus on community support programs will be applied in 2012 covering (and not exclusive to) areas such as mental and physical health and wellbeing, life skills, awareness campaigns and social responsibility.

As alluded to earlier, the staffing structure of the NFL has undergone a dramatic change in 2011. Three of our four full-time staff members were new in 2011 and the one constant through that was Delwyn Berry. Her diligence and commitment is a most precious commodity and I thank her for her efforts. Samuel Zito in the media portfolio and Ron McKeown in operations have quickly found their feet and have been tremendous contributors thus far. As they develop in their roles, the NFL will certainly be the beneficiary and together an enviable team has evolved. Kevin Smith, in the part-time capacity of Director of Umpiring, continues to impart the highest level of umpiring experience to our emerging group and with the benefits of significant investment in umpire resources for 2012, Kevin will have the tools to take the group even further. Our other part-time staff, including David Page, Tracey Goss, Nicole Fisher and Diane Herman, have been a tremendous support all season and I thank them for the quality of their work.

AFL Victoria continues to support the NFL with dedicated resources in Phiv Demetriou and Tom Delahunty, and under the stewardship of General Manager Grant Williams, community football has a significant voice and representation within the AFL. AFL Victoria continues to lobby for greater investment at community level and we are hopeful that this will realise significant improvements in the very near future. The investment in coaching development and Auskick remains constant and I thank both Phiv and Tom for their work in these and other areas.

Towards the end of 2011, the NFL and Darebin City Council rejuvenated discussions around a new base for the NFL and this has progressed to the stage that plans and costings are now being finalised. It is envisaged that during the season of 2013, the NFL will take possession of new facilities at CT Barling Reserve and we are endeavouring to ensure that through Darebin and State Government funding, NFL assets and AFL support, the development requires no additional financial input from clubs. Barling Reserve will provide a social and training base for NFL umpires, superior administrative facilities and the ability to stage NFL events, finals (junior) and promotions. There are also plans to investigate synthetic surface opportunities in the near future, however that is not part of the immediate development. All in all, the Barling Reserve development will provide the NFL a facility that is the envy of community sporting organisations and allow us more scope to meet our objectives.

The NFL is indeed fortunate to have a hardworking team of Directors dedicated to the growth, development and state of the League. The Board has shouldered much responsibility in the absence of administrative positions and much of their work goes unnoticed and unacknowledged. To Tony Topp, Dean Philpots and the rest of the NFL Board of Directors, I thank you personally for the enthusiasm, passion and dedication you have to the League. This is by no means a team of faceless men and the NFL will soon see the benefits of a strong and dynamic Strategic Plan developed through their efforts.

2012 will bring new challenges for the NFL together with new opportunities. A new competition (under 12 girls) and a significant

investment in umpire resources and coaching will be a key focus along with improving nonclub revenue and operational efficiencies. A strong desire to keep club costs down in a time of continual expenditure increases, together with strengthening support for vulnerable clubs should ensure stability whilst providing the foundation for growth.

Finally, thank you to all stakeholders in the NFL for your continual support and engagement with our League. We look forward to building on that relationship in 2012.



FOOTBALL OPERATIONS REPORT

Ron McKeown Football Operations Manager

First off, let me start by thanking the board for appointing me to the position of Football Operations Manager. It has been an at times challenging, but also rewarding three month settling in period. I am really looking forward to what lies ahead and working with everybody involved to make the Northern Football League the strongest and most player-friendly competition on Victoria.

Junior finals in 2011 saw teams from all but two junior clubs compete in the finals series. It was great to see everyone involved in the finals compete in the true spirit of the game. In our desperate hope for finals success we can sometimes forget the importance of good sportsmanship, and I am pleased and proud to say that the players of the Northern Football League conducted themselves respectfully and with fair play throughout the three weeks of the finals. Some of the highlights of the junior finals were Eltham under 16s continuing their remarkable unbeaten run in Grand Finals by winning their seventh premiership in a row, and Bundoora Park under 10s winning a premiership in their first year in the Northern Football League.

With Bundoora Park and Laurimar joining the junior competition in 2011, it means we have not only two new clubs but five new teams. It takes our total junior participation to 25 clubs, 191 teams and around 4000 kids playing football in the NFL.

We tried something new with the senior finals this year and held all the Division 3 finals at Epping Recreation Reserve. This allowed us to utilise both grounds, which proved to be a great draw card for the competition and gave the finals series a carnival-like atmosphere. South Morang made history by winning the Division 3 Grand Final and claiming its first senior premiership in 56 years. Panton Hill also broke a long premiership drought when it won the reserves Grand Final. The flag was the Redbacks' first since way back in 1955, before it was even part of our league.

The following weekend saw Lower Plenty take home all three Division 2 premiership cups, with each the seniors, reserves and under 19s victorious on Grand Final day. It is a fantastic effort by all involved at the club as it once again joins the top flight. On the final Saturday of September Division 1 traditional rivals Bundoora and Heidelberg played out a highly skilled and spirited Grand Final at Preston City Oval. Both teams put on a great show for the big crowd that had turned out and, after falling agonisingly short on several occasions over the past decade, it was Bundoora who was victorious as it claimed its first flag since 1996. Congratulations also to Montmorency for winning the reserves premiership and to Greensborough who claimed its third successive under 19s title.

Finals attendances were up on last year right across the board which is great news for our competition and a testament to the standard of football being played in our league. The improved standard is due in part to the influx of ex-AFL players and TAC players finding their way back to their roots. This is a direct result of the growing respect the Northern Football League is earning and we look forward to attracting an even greater number of high calibre players over coming seasons.

I also wish to congratulate all the competition trophy winners in their respective divisions and age groups. Also, well done to all the members of the Coaches Team of the Year across all three divisions. It's an honour to be recognised by your peers and you all deserved your selection in 2011.

Director of Umpiring Kevin Smith and his panel have continued their fine efforts in training and educating NFL umpires and have ensured that our umpiring fraternity contributes to the enviable standard at which the game is played in the Northern Football League. Thank you also to all the independent tribunal members who have all played a significant role in guiding the league into the direction we want to head towards.

The Junior Development Program continues to support the education and development of talented players within our league. A huge thank you goes out to all the coaches who offered their time to nurture our young stars. Your continued support of this program is very much appreciated and you all do a great job. Thank you also to all the parents who helped out as team managers, trainers, water boys or runners; it is greatly appreciated. Congratulations to all the players who represented the league throughout the season. We are looking to make a number of changes to our representative program next year and we look forward to working much closer with the Northern Knights to ensure our representative teams become much more competitive out on the ground.

Congratulations and thank you to Jeremy, Delwyn and Samuel. The smooth running of the Northern Football League is in no small part due to your dedication and diligent work. I sincerely thank you for your patience and support.

Finally, thank you to all the volunteers within the NFL. The success of the league and all of our clubs is dependent upon your contribution, both great and small. It would not be possible to have a competition without you and I am in awe of your dedication. Thank you.

UMPIRES REPORT

Kevin Smith Director of Umpiring

The Northern Football League umpiring group was once again able to service all its requirements during the 2011 season, which in itself is a great achievement given the difficulties that can be met in recruiting people to umpiring. Each of the disciplines – field, goal and boundary umpiring – performed well and this was very pleasing.

The finals performance of umpires in particular was outstanding and generally speaking there was little in the way of comment from participating clubs which is always a good sign. The stronger umpiring performance seen in finals matches in 2011 can be attributed in part to the league extending its three umpire system for both field and boundary umpires even further than was the case in the previous season.

Once again, even more umpires were able to take part in not just a finals match but also in Grand Finals which not only gives a real boost to the group but assists in the good conduct of matches and this was obvious to those in attendance. I believe this allows too for a better standard of football for both participants and spectators alike. The under 19 finals continued to provide opportunity for those umpires, field, boundary and goal, in the formative years of their umpiring.

The loss of a number of senior field umpires at the end of the 2010 season was regrettable as they cannot easily be replaced. This was further impacted by the loss of two very senior field umpires during 2011 and a number of younger inexperienced field umpires needed to step up a level.

Recruiting continued to be particularly strong in 2011 but at the same time a good number of umpires decided not to continue with the league for what they see as good reasons. It is a challenge in our league to retain umpires to the degree I would like and this is not easy given that a lot leave due to study, commencing work, moving away, playing football, losing interest, and, on occasions, the environment they encounter at matches.

The quite expansive local schools program of addressing assemblies and smaller groups of students with recruiting in mind continued in 2011 and again proved to be productive. The delivering of the Basic Umpiring Course in a number of schools in the league's area of interest continued successfully and an Umpire Academy at Parade College was also successful.

As is the case across the board with other participants in football, there is an accreditation program for umpiring and in 2011 some 40 umpires representing all three disciplines successfully completed either a Level One or Level Two accreditation program.

Nine umpires have received an invite to trial with the VFL for the 2012 season and all seem likely to be promoted to its list, meaning we will again need to find replacements.

I would like to thank George Smith (fitness coach), Darren Agnew (juniors umpire coach), Shane Herbert (goal umpire coach) and Doug Armstrong (boundary umpire coach) who worked so diligently and successfully throughout the season. A big thanks too to Brian Moore (secretary of the coaching panel) who worked across all disciplines to assist in the smooth running of umpiring. To these, along with all those who supported each of the coaches and those who carried out observations and mentoring, your magnificent efforts were appreciated and resulted in many umpires having a feeling of being supported and showing a significant improvement.

The former NFL CEO Kevin Crompton and Football Operations Manager Jarrad Carey continued to support umpiring and were always happy to discuss umpiring matters and to give assistance when needed. This has continued by those replacing those gentlemen, Jeremy Bourke and Ron McKeown respectively.

Each of the staff contributed to umpiring in some way on a regular basis and I am thankful for this. Delwyn Berry was involved in umpiring on general administration matters and Media and Communications Officer Samuel Zito made himself available to me when I needed his assistance. It is true to say the league board always showed support for and interest in umpiring too.

A further expansion of the three umpire system where appropriate, providing the cost of the green shirt uniform for new field umpires, funding umpire accreditation courses and the funding of an appropriate training facility for the umpiring group have all contributed to increased numbers and a satisfactory umpiring performance.

Tony Mahoney continued as president of the Northern Umpires Association and the NUA supported both myself and the umpiring group by doing whatever it could to assist in providing an appropriate umpiring environment. Among other things, it arranged for the provision of meals and refreshments after training, put forward social activities and both the junior and senior presentation nights were a success. Arranging an experienced umpire as an advocate for umpires attending the tribunal was an important role it performed and I want to thank the NUA for its efforts throughout 2011.

I want to congratulate all those umpires who received a finals appointment of any kind, especially a Grand Final appointment as you will have deserved it. I want to especially congratulate those umpires who umpired the Division One A Grade Grand Final in such an efficient and unobtrusive manner. Well done to field umpires Steve Williams, Nathan Lessels and Andrew O'Neill, boundary umpires Brendan Canty, Jeff Miller and Lawrence Coop and goal umpires Craig Herman and Matt Lafite.

Field umpire Steve Williams, who umpired his second successive Division One A Grade Grand Final this year, received an award for Most Outstanding Umpire for 2011 at the NFL Presentation Night. Another field umpire, Luke Richardson, received the Most Improved Umpire award.



JUNIOR CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Dean Philpots Junior Chairman

This year saw the introduction of two new clubs into the NFL junior competition in Laurimar and Bundoora Park, with the latter winning the under 10 Green premiership in its inaugural season. For the second year in a row the total number of teams competing in the junior competition increased, with an additional five sides stepping onto the field this year, taking our total figure to 191 sides competing in the junior competition every weekend.

In 2011, the NFL Junior Development Program continued to grow and we were successful in fielding teams in all age groups from the under 13s to the under 17s, and, for the first time, Youth Girls. The Junior Development Program is currently going through a review and I expect the league will adopt a new direction which will include more involvement from the Northern Knights. I anticipate this to strengthen our representative program and the junior to senior pathway in our league. It should also ensure players get the best opportunity to play at their highest level and continue to play football beyond their junior years.

Throughout the season we also managed to ensure all our junior coaches were accredited at Level 1 and this was achieved with a great effort from AFL Victoria Northern Region Community Development Manager, Phiv Demetriou.

We also saw more junior clubs and Auskick centres merge under the one banner and this has provided a great opportunity for players and families to move smoothly from the Auskick program to the competitive football arena. Tom Delahunty has worked particularly hard to ensure that the Auskick program continues to grow within our northern region. I see this as an important start for junior football and all clubs should ensure they have an involvement in their local Auskick centre.

The work of the Auskick co-ordinators and juniors clubs has led to an increase in participants at the under 9 level in 2011. This year we had over 880 players under the age of 9 play in the NFL. Our next challenge as a league is to ensure to all players, parents, officials, coaches and umpires that we can continue to manage our growth.

As of the time of writing, we are looking at also becoming our own association, governed by our own rules and by-laws. Our current setup binds us to the Plenty Valley Netball Association.

INFL DIVISION 1 REVIEW



After coming agonisingly close to Grand Final glory so often over the past decade, 2011 was to be the year that Bundoora finally broke through for its fourth senior premiership.

Having lost four Grand Finals to Heidelberg over the past seven years, the Bulls exacted revenge on the Tigers with a 10-point win on the final Saturday of September.

The success broke a 15-year premiership drought stemming back to 1996 and could potentially be the start of a successful dynasty at Yulong Reserve.

After a fruitful off-season recruiting campaign which yielded former AFL players Cameron Cloke and Gary Moorcroft, along with Matthew Dennis and Andrew Carmcusciano, the Bulls topped the Division One ladder for all but five weeks of the season.

They won their opening seven games of the year and claimed the minor premiership with a 13-5 win-loss record.

Heidelberg rallied from a slow start to finish the season in second spot, just 1.4 percent behind the Bulls.

Bundoora emphatically beat the Tigers in the second semi final to charge into the Grand

Final, the result providing great confidence to Phil Maylin's troops when they faced the Tigers in the big dance a fortnight later.

Courtesy of a strong breeze blowing to the Preston Market end of Preston City Oval, the Bulls jumped out to an early lead in the premiership decider and took an 18-point advantage into the first break.

The Tigers bounced back with four of the next five goals to assume a six-point break at half time, before Josh Houlihan kicked the first goal of the third quarter as Heidelberg looked destined for its sixth flag in eight years.

Goalless for the opening ten minutes of the term, the Bulls then played an inspired 20 minutes of football to tear the game open.

Sparked by Michael Farrelly and Matthew Dennis in the middle of the ground and Cloke up forward, Bundoora kicked five unanswered goals to turn for home 24 points in front.

Jess Sinclair goaled early in the final quarter to give the Tigers hope, but two consecutive goals into the breeze by Moorcroft and Trent Barbero extended the Bulls' lead to five goals.

As old warriors Blair Harvey, Danny Nolan and Jake Williams continued to work tirelessly against the odds, Heidelberg refused to surrender and kicked three late majors to reduce the deficit to 10 points with several minutes remaining.

However, the Bulls were able to hold the Tigers off in the dying stages and held on for a memorable win.

Cloke immortalised himself in Bundoora folklore when he reeled in six contested marks during the final quarter to continually keep Heidelberg at bay when it needed to get hold of the football.

He was just beaten for best afield honours by Farrelly who capped of a great year with another dominant display when it mattered most.

Montmorency won its first premiership since 2005 when its reserves toppled Bundoora by 21 points in a tight encounter.

Meanwhile, Greensborough won its third consecutive premiership in the under 19s when it also beat Bundoora.

Josh Callaway was best afield as the Boro ran away with 24-point win to complete another dominant season under Ben Turner.

DIVISION 2 REVIEW



2011 will forever be remembered as the year Lower Plenty dominated the NFL Division 2 competition.

The Bears finished atop each of the senior, reserves and under 19 ladders before going on to win the premiership in all three grades.

Combined, Lower Plenty's three sides lost just two games for the entire season as the club showed just how much depth and class it had at its disposal.

Following an agonising 14-point loss to Whittlesea in last year's Grand Final, the Lower Plenty seniors were unstoppable in 2011 as they searched for promotion into Division 1.

Under the guidance of Gary Ramsay, the side won 19 of the 20 games it competed in by an average margin of 66 points.

That included an astonishing 201-point win over recently-promoted Hurstbridge in Round 4, as the Bears showed their intent early in the season.

Despite the side's dominance throughout the season, many pundits felt that Lower Plenty could be upstaged in the Grand Final when it came up against an Epping outfit looking for its first premiership since 1990.

But with the wind blowing a gale to the city end

of Preston City Oval, Lower effectively sealed the premiership in the first quarter when it raced out to a 31-point lead.

After the Blues kicked the opening two goals of the game through Jarrod King and Tim Likos, Lower responded with seven consecutive goals, including a remarkable 45m effort by Shannon Strickland while hemmed up against the boundary line.

Star forward Darcy Barden then moved deep into defence in the second quarter and repelled countless Epping forays forward, as Lower Plenty managed to keep the Blues goalless while kicking with a wind worth at least four goals.

Lower again showed how best to use the wind in the third and kicked three goals in the first seven minutes of the second half to stretch its lead to 50 points as the realisation hit that the club had won its second senior premiership, 12 years after its first in 1999.

Matthew Garland pegged back a goal for Epping late in the third to reduce the margin to 47 points at the final break, however with Darcy Barden again patrolling the backline in the final term, Lower Plenty once again kept the Blues goalless kicking with the breeze.

Ben Gill booted the only goal of the final term

and with that gave the Bears a 52-point win when the final siren blew.

Barden was named best afield for his superb defensive efforts, just edging out three-time best and fairest winner Clint Monger and young ruckman Patrick Flynn.

After finishing the regular season undefeated, the Bears' reserves had to take the long route to the Grand Final after they were upset by Diamond Creek in the second semi final.

However that loss was to be just a blip on the radar as the Bears trounced the Demons in the premiership decider.

Lower Plenty kicked eight unanswered goals in the final term to romp to a 78-point win, as Diamond Creek was restricted to just three goals for the day, and only one after quarter time.

It was a similar story in the under 19s Grand Final as Lower Plenty completed an undefeated season when it too smashed Diamond Creek.

After leading by just two points at half time, the Bears kicked 12 goals to two in the second half to claim a 66-point win.

Nathan Hendry was awarded best on ground honours, while exciting forward Jake Paterson booted five goals.

DIVISION 3 REVIEW

Remarkably, both losses were by just five points and came either side of an 11-game winning streak, the longest the club has ever recorded. Whitnall booted nine goals in the second semi final to steer the Lions past Parkside by 53 points and propel South Morang into its first Grand Final.

Parkside then nearly squandered a nine-goal lead in the preliminary final against Panton Hill, and had to twice come from behind in the final term before setting up another clash with South Morang for the premiership cup.

The large South Morang faithful who crowded into Epping Recreation Reserve on Grand Final day were left shell-shocked in the first quarter as Parkside kicked the opening seven goals of the match to take a 27-point lead into quarter time.

But from there the Lions showed why they

were the best team all year, kicking 11 goals to Parkside's three after the first break to claim a 23-point victory.

Matt Manning was adjudged best afield for a dominant performance in the ruck, ahead of Jinnette and Whitnall, who kicked five to take his finals goal tally to 14 in just two games.

Earlier in the day Panton Hill also created history when it claimed its first open grade premiership since joining the league, with a runaway 38-point win over Reservoir.

Chris Sansom was awarded the best on ground medal for his work in the ruck, while John Garrard was superb up forward and kicked five goals in a low-scoring encounter.

The Northern Region held its annual Coach of the Year awards night on Wednesday, September 7 and it was Epping coach Mario Bandera who saluted as Senior Coach of the Year.

In front of more than 230 guests at Ballara Receptions in Eltham, Bandera won the award – as selected by the Australian Football Coaches Association – ahead of Bryan Cole (Greensborough), Gary Kallinikos (South Morang) and Dean Sinclair (Lalor).

Bandera guided Epping into the Division 2 Grand Final in 2011, and was among four nominees shortlisted for the AFCA Victoria Coach of the Year award, which was eventually won by Albury Tigers coach Paul Spargo.

After dropping their first two games of the season, the Blues won 14 of their final 17 home and away games to finish second on the Division 2 ladder.

Bandera's meticulous approach to coaching earned him great praise within the football community and was the key reason behind him being selected for the award.

At the conclusion of every match in 2011, every Epping player filled in an evaluation report to rate their performance that day.

Players were asked to rate 10 key attributes, including ball winning ability, leadership, hardness and running capacity.

Coaches then provide their evaluation of each players' game before compiling the data into a graph which provided a season average and match comparisons. Every player then received a one-page written review from Bandera which highlighted his thoughts on their game and provided feedback on areas in which the player needed to address.

Bandera thanked the Epping Football Club during his acceptance speech, and praised all junior coaches present on the night who helped to nurture young footballers as they progressed through to senior ranks.

Earlier in the night, Greensborough under 19s coach Ben Turner was named Youth Coach of the Year.

In 2011 the Boro under 19s won their third consecutive premiership under Turner's tutelage.

Other winners on the night were Michael Kanizay (Auskick Coach of the Year), Michael Bland (Auskick Volunteer of the Year), Anthony Mallia (Junior Coach of the Year) and Laura Attard (Female Coach of the Year).

Ivan Jones was also recognised for his contribution to football which has seen him fulfil roles as a recruiter for the Collingwood Football Club, treasurer of Bundoora JFC, photographer for the Northern Knights and for the past 14 years Auskick treasurer for the Northern Region.

Special guests at the dinner included 2011 Brownlow medallist Dane Swan, Gavin Brown, John Barker, Matthew Capuano and Stephanie Chiocci.

COACHES TEAMS OF THE YEAR

Premier Bundoora had five representatives in the Division 1 Coaches Team of the Year, with Ben Shelton, Cameron Cloke, Gary Moorcroft, David Mitchell and John Kreuzer all selected in the team.

Bears' coach Gary Ramsay was named as coach of the team after his side lost just one game en route to the 2011 premiership.


In Division 3, South Morang was rewarded for its season of dominance with five representatives named in the side.





After an injury-plagued 2010 season, Heidelberg's Michael Finn returned to form emphatically in 2011 to take out the Frank Rosbrook Medal as the best and fairest player in Division 1.

Following the resignation of senior coach Gavin Crosisca after Round 3, Finn was thrown into the ruck by new playing-coach Blair Harvey and the switch paid immediate dividends.

The Irishman polled two votes in his first game in the ruck against Whittlesea in Round 4, before polling a further 20 over the remaining 14 rounds to win the award on 22 votes ahead of silky Macleod midfielder Justin White and Greensborough's Conlan Gunn.

Having already accomplished much in a decorated career, which includes two premierships with Heidelberg along with selection in the club's Team of the Decade, 2011 was still somewhat of a breakout season for Finn. Often overshadow by some of his more high profile teammates, Finn became a standout throughout the season and was awarded best on ground honours on five occasions.

He was instrumental in the Tigers' two-point win over Greensborough in Round 15, the victory ultimately handing the side a place inside the top two come season's end.

Remarkably, Finn missed the final two games of the home and away season and instead played for Ireland in its victorious 2011 International Cup campaign.

He was named best on ground in the Grand Final as the Irish came from four goals behind Papa New Guinea to win by 18 points on the MCG.

Greensborough's Leigh Millsom took out the reserves award with 20 votes, which included eight votes in the final three games of the year.

Heidelberg's Lloyd Toffolon finished in second place with 16 votes, ahead of competition leading goalkicker Mathew Pow from Bundoora who polled 14.

Salvatore Mamone got the umpires nod in the under 19s, in front of Northcote Park duo Brock McLennan and Harley Short.

Macleod skipper Kane Shaw was voted the Coaches Player of the Year, winning the prestigious award by a single vote from Northcote Park skipper Bronik Davies who missed the last three games of the season through injury.

Shaw received top votes on four occasions from the opposition coaches and was given two votes in five matches as he proved once and for all that he is one of the competition's premier defenders.

He just missed out on being drafted last year after a dominant season with the Northern Knights and Vic Metro, but in 2011 Darcy Barden confirmed he has what it takes to reach the top level.

NFL COMMUNITIES WORKING TOGETHER

As underlined by our "Communities Working Together" tagline, the NFL ensured it continued to play its part in giving back to the community in 2011.

Throughout the season the league supported an array of charities and it was encouraging to see many clubs follow the league's example and implement their own initiatives to help out those in need.

For the second year running Greensborough discarded its traditional green strip to pull on an alternate guernsey in the name of charity.

After donning a pink strip in 2010 to raise funds for the McGrath Foundation, the Boro this year wore a white and blue jumper to raise support and awareness for the E.J Whitten Foundation.

Ted Whitten Jr, the CEO of the E.J Whitten Foundation, was a guest speaker at a luncheon held by the club prior to its Round 4 home match against Eltham and also spoke about the foundation established in his late father's honour to the 88.6 Plenty Valley FM 'Match of the Day' team during its radio broadcast of the match.

Through a number of fundraising activities, including an auction of sporting memorabilia, the club raised in excess of \$10,000 which it kindly handed over to the E.J Whitten Foundation.

During the year Epping and Lalor, two of the NFL's oldest foes, cast aside their rivalry to

raise over \$4000 for the Mercy Hospital's premature baby ward during their Round 1 and 9 matches.

It came after two Epping players, Jarrod King and Brad Hollow, both endured tough battles following the premature births of their sons. Sadly Jarrod's son Codi, who was born three months premature, passed away during the season but not before putting up an inspirational fight.

The clubs banded together in the tough time following Codi's passing and with the support of North Heidelberg dug deep to raise a further \$2500 for the Mercy Hospital.

The Bloods also held a 'Call to Arms' fundraiser when they took on Thomastown over the Queen's Birthday weekend and were humbled when the Bears donated \$500 towards the cause.

In the final game of the home and away season, St Mary's hosted a luncheon for Breast Cancer Network Australia with all proceeds going to the foundation. The Burras held the event at Whatmough Park, with each of the Burras' senior, reserves and under 19 sides wearing pink jumpers for their matches against South Morang.

Macleod used its first home game of the season to launch the Awareness Cup and Steve Rowley Medal. The club used the day to support beyondblue: the national depression initiative and held a match day luncheon which featured guest speaker Daniel Kowalski. The first week of the NFL senior finals was played in recognition of Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia with all clubs wearing blue armbands to raise awareness about an illness which affects almost 20,000 Australian men annually.

A month later the league hosted the White Ribbon Grand Final Luncheon at Preston City Oval ahead of the Division One premiership decider between Bundoora and Heidelberg. More than 120 guests attended the sold-out event as the NFL threw its support behind the foundation which aims to eliminate violence against women by promoting cultural change amongst men.

Volunteers from the White Ribbon Campaign were present on the day and handed out information flyers and wrist bands to the big crowd, while the White Ribbon Campaign's logo was embedded onto the concrete around Preston City Oval.

The juniors also played their part by wearing rainbow laces across all three weeks of their finals series as they acknowledged Zaidee's Rainbow Foundation which aims to make organ and tissue donation awareness more prevalent in our community. The umpires also got in on the act, making for a colourful junior finals series.

The NFL commends every club and player who did their bit in support of charity this year, and is looking forward to extending its contribution to such worthy causes next season.

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

(c) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(d) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reasonably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

(i) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(j) Income Tax

The associations' profits are exempt from income tax under Section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act.
